Hospital Based On Call Doula Project

Project goal: improve maternal and infant health outcomes by increasing access to doula care. To achieve this, we are collaborating with BirthNet to provide effective on-call hospital-based doula availability.

Other goals of this project are:

- to amplify the voices of BIPOC birthing people;
- recruiting, training, supporting and employing BIPOC individuals;
- ensuring that free doula services are available to all birthing people, regardless of race, ethnicity and socio-economic status; and
- connecting all birthing people with doulas from their communities or cultural backgrounds, should they request it.

Our goals are based on quality outcomes data and patient surveys.

C-section rates by race

Among birthing people at St. Peter's Hospital from Q2 2021 to present, 68% are White, 14% are Black, 5.2% are Asian, 1.5% are Other, 1.3% are Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 1.2% are Two or More Races, and 0.2% are American Indian/Alaska Native.

Interpreting the data

• The overall C-section rate is **above average** for birthing people who identify as:

Two or More Races (50%),

American Indian/Alaska Native (47.1%),

Black or African American (42.1%),

Other (42.1%), and

Asian (41.9%).

• The C-section rate is **below average** for birthing people whose race is documented as:


White (40.4%);

Unknown (38.2%); and

Declined (34%).

• The C-section rate is **above average** for Hispanic birthing people.

What the PREM is telling us

PREM: Patient Reported Experience Measure

- An anonymous patient experience survey administered by QR code in 12 languages.
- NYS Birth Equity Improvement Project; measures patient experience for all live birth discharges.
- Responses go directly to NYSDOH for analysis. Aggregate results reported to birthing facilities monthly; stratified by race, ethnicity and language.
- Survey results inform action plans.
- Our focus area: improve communication between the patient and the care team.

Project successes

Six BIPOC individuals completed doula training.

Since September 2023, BirthNet doulas have completed nine 12-hour shifts, assisting 11 patients.

- Of the 11 births, only 27.3% (3) were C-sections. This is a 12.8% reduction in C-sections among patients who received doula supports.
 - Due to the small sample size, we cannot infer that the doula program caused this change, but we will continue to monitor C-section rates as the program expands.

Examples of doula supports:

- Support breathing through contractions.
- Provide birthing balls to help with lower back pain.
- Provide comfort measures.

Patients assisted by doulas were grateful for the support and appreciative of this added service.



Challenges

Contract development was more complicated than anticipated.

Onboarding: doulas were viewed as contracted providers, required to meet credentialing requirements:

- Background checks.
- Health screening/immunizations.
- Mandatory education modules.

Educating hospital staff on the role of the doula, collaborating as a team.

Ideally, doulas would be involved with the birthing person before the actual labor and delivery, to establish a trusting relationship with the patient and build awareness of the birth plan.



What's next?

Based on the success of the pilot project and community feedback, we believe that St. Peter's Hospital would benefit from:

- hiring per diem doulas to Labor and Delivery units; and
- offering doula services prenatally, during delivery and postpartum.

Grant funding (pending) will enable us to provide doula services to all individuals, regardless of insurance coverage/ability to pay.

What is a doula?

A doula is a professional, trained childbirth assistant who provides nonmedical support.

Doulas can:

- Whelp you prepare and carry out your childbirth plans
- 💓 Guide and support you during labor and childbirth
- 💓 Help you with breastfeeding and caring for your newborn

People giving birth with support from a doula are also more likely to:

- 💓 Have a shorter labor
- Initiate breastfeeding earlier and breastfeed for longer
- Have positive feelings about their birth experience
- Have better mother-baby bonding
